

Although in schools rugby is traditionally played during the winter term and finishes at Christmas, we are lucky that there is a separate version of the game that is played in warmer weather. This year we took our year 7 and year 11 teams to the county rugby 7's tournament held at The Bishop of Herefords Bluecoat school. For the year 7 pupils this was a completely new experience and adaptation of the game compared to what they have previously participated in. This year there have been few opportunities for the year 7 pupils to play any form of rugby. For some of the pupils this was only their third time playing in a competitive scenario. They played against schools such as Hereford Cathedral School, Bishops, St. Mary's, Hereford academy and White cross. The pupils who took part demonstrated a fantastic attitude and level of sportsmanship. There were victories and a handful of narrow losses all of which were within two scores. This team has a lot of potential and they will no doubt be successful in rugby 7's and 15's in their years to come.

The year 11 team after good success last year turned up with a high level of expectation. We had a few last minute injuries but fortunately, we were able to still arrive with a full squad. The weather was very poor which meant that the style of play needed to be adapted and limited some creativity. The players started with a tight and successful game against St. Marys with tries being scored throughout both halves. The heavens opened midway through the first game and stayed that way for the remainder of the afternoon. Matches followed against White cross and Bishops with a victory against White cross and sadly a loss against a very well organised and experienced Bishops side. Kingstone High School Students mark Holocaust Memorial Day

Key Stage 3 students at Kingstone High School marked Holocaust Memorial Day on Friday 27th January with a 'Drop Down Day' where students had a series of special lessons to find out more and reflect on the events of the Holocaust. This included a lower school assembly and work looking at the roles played by Perpetrators, Collaborators, Bystanders and Resisters. Students also looked at artwork portraying the Holocaust and learnt about the Jewish practise of using stones as memorials. The day culminated with students finding the name of a Holocaust victim and decorating a stone in their memory. The stones were then used to create a cairn in the school grounds to remember the day and the events of the Holocaust. Mr Booy, the school's SPHERE Coordinator, said 'Each year we like to come together as a school to raise awareness and focus



on a particular event or theme. This year we chose the Holocaust as it is important that students do not forget and can actually speak out against actions of genocide that unfortunately continue around the world to this day.

Had luck favoured them a little more, they could well be looking at the knockout stages as well.
